

Variety. That's the key word for our current show in the West Wing Gallery. Artwork by our guild members always displays a variety of visions and media. But it's doubly so for this show, since no theme was given.

A beautiful small untitled painting by Nancy Russell greets visitors to the show. Diana Stepp's "Looking for Jesus" is a clever 3-D approach to using collage. And the ironic wooden sculpture by Gayton Arrigotti entitled "Evolution" is made of slices from a tree trunk, along with a pencil and pencil shavings.

Sandra Scowen's fused glass plate "Truth is What the Opposites Have In Common" seems to glow from inside. Jane Parker's "1906" is a timely look-back at the 1906 earthquake. "Lost and Found" by Charlotte Seekamp is a clever installation. And "Guarding the Silence" by M. Victoria Vargas (who coordinated this show for the guild) is a haunting work in fiber. Pixels and Paint features photography and paintings by mother and daughter June and Susan Felter. The show was curated by Susan Hillhouse.

June Felter is a nationally recognized artist who began her career as a commercial artist during World War II. Her paintings were used to encourage the purchase of war bonds and to help the Red Cross. Following the war she studied with Richard Diebenkorn and Bruce McGaw at the California School of Fine Arts.

In October 1991, June lost many of her paintings when her studio burned in the Oakland Hills fire. Three months after the fire she exhibited paintings of the fire and one of the works, depicting the Oakland hills on fire, was purchased by the George Krevsky Gallery which he donated to the Oakland Museum.

For her current show, she is exhibiting recent watercolor still-lives and other works. "There's something about paying attention to the good things in life that I like to see, to paint and be aware of."

Susan Felter, June's daughter, is exhibiting work from her "Hunting & Gathering" photo-montage series, now in its tenth year. Originally inspired by 17th century Dutch still-life artists who would magically defy nature by painting flowers and plants of different seasons within a single image. Each image is a montage of 100 to 200 photographic elements, assembled in her computer. "Nature is fascinating and strange all by itself," Susan says, "but the possibility of making further mischief of my own has been irresistible."

Her photographs and computer art has been exhibited and published both in the United States and abroad. The show runs through April 8th.
